  - a) Postponed Finalize working group assignments; discuss first steps until next meeting

## 5. New business:

a. Discussion of possibilities for Barre city to learn about the Vermont climate action lawsuit against oil companies identifying the city's flood devastation as cause for standing. – Rep Jonathan Williams informed us about the state's Climate Superfund bill progress with the lawsuit and assured us there was no need to have the city enjoin the process at this time. Support for the lawsuit would be helpful, but the suit as it currently stands includes the entire state and is earmarked for the flood damaged areas of Vermont.

Joelen: Responsibility and resources to compensate Vermont for the damages large corporations who caused climate change leading to increase weather devastation. The City could sign an amicus brief to support the state's effort, explaining what it cost our community.

William: Global Warming Solutions Act unfairly puts the burden on small local oil firms, Williams said he would look into the possible disparity.

Chris: The lawsuit has not been filed, it was enacted in July of this year and the attorney general's office in working on it.

Ellen: We cannot shoulder the costs of these flood recovery projects, no municipality can pay for climate change damages. Bring us information as it goes for us to be creative in our approach.

- c. Report from meeting with City Council Joelen reported that one of the problems between the council and our committee is that we have been struggling with how to serve the council best. We are still trying to get the council to accept our charge. Some City Council members are continuing to bash us and there is concern about our future relationship with them?

Chris: Suggested more frequent presence at Council meeting so we are more recognized.
